## The Social Media Feature Quilt!

It's been rough not being to meet in person and share whatever we've been creating with others. I'm sure you miss seeing the quilts that we were treated to at the guild meetings in the past. It's been almost TWO years since we were last able to get together and celebrate each other's creations! Zoom meetings just aren't the same are they?

With this in mind we've come up with an idea to continue the tradition of sharing our creations. We're calling it the Social Media Feature Quilt and this is how it works:

- 1) Enter a quilt by emailing one photo of the whole quilt and one photo of a detail you wish to draw attention to this might be a close up of your perfect points, or needle turned applique, or the quilting, whatever you want to show off on your quilt. - 2) You are limited to ONE entry per month. In June and then December when we usually have our Socials the photos will be displayed in a poll and members will choose which one they like. This is like the Viewers' Choice at our Quilt Shows. If we're able to meet in person, you'll be asked to bring your quilt to the meeting.
- 3) The winning quilt will be featured as the Banner photo on our Guild's official Facebook page, the Guild's Members Facebook group, the Guild website and in the Newsletter.

- 5) The quilts entered each month will be published in the newsletter so we'll have some extra eye candy to look forward to each month.

# **Community Projects Report - April**



### The Ukrainian Comfort Project

We are all heartbroken by the horror of the war Russia has declared on Ukraine. The need and desire to do something is being felt by so many of us. Here are some details of what our Guild is doing:

- 1. Children with cancer are already arriving and being treated at Sick Kids in Toronto. Pillowcases in blues and yellows that have a fun theme would be a wonderful way of showing them and their families that we care about them. Please contact Fern Pugh if you have fabric to donate or wish to sew pillowcases. Contact Fern at 519-941-8515 or elizabethfern15@gmail.com
- 2. Quilts of any size, from baby on up to twin are what we want to have ready for the refugees who will be arriving in our area. Some large bed sized ones are also hoped for. It'll depend on

how much we sew! We are asking for donations from your stash -

blues, yellows, and whites.

- 3. We are working on patterns for quilt blocks and had a very productive day on March 25th at Louise's house cutting kits that you can simply pick up, put together and then return. However, if you want to make a block on your own please choose a finished size of 6, 12 or 18 inches and use blues and yellows with a white background. The BOM block #5 would make a perfect Sunflower block, with nothing more than a change in colour!
- 4. The first sewing day is at The Centre Fellowship Church on April 2<sup>nd</sup>. This date is prior to the distribution of the April newsletter but take heart, we have another date! St. Mark's on First Avenue (just East of First Street) has offered us space to sew there on Saturday May 14<sup>th</sup> from 9AM to 5 PM. Their only request is that we be vaccinated for **COVID.** If you want to sew, bring your usual sewing equipment and don't forget the power cord!

- 5. Then we will be looking to the longarm owners in our guild for quilting.
- 6. Louise Cornelius and Penny Squirrell are heading this up for Community Projects. Contact information and pick up/drop off locations will be announced soon via email or refer to the Guild Facebook site.

We will also accept monetary donations that will be sent directly to Ukraine. We have a potential contact for monetary donations. Becky, one half of Quilted Twins (their website has amazing free patterns that most of us already know about), is in Poland and has spearheaded an effort to shelter, feed and clothe refuges pouring over the border from Ukraine. We have to "cement" this contact so more news on that to come.

Last but certainly not least, a huge THANK YOU to those members who have already raided their stashes and given us fabrics to work with. We are so appreciative of members once again stepping up to take part in these projects we come up with. We still have more fabric coming so there won't be any shortage of something to cut or sew on these two dates.

Other news ..... Four quilts were given to refugees and Fern delivered 130 pillowcases to Comfy Cases. Thanks to our members for your donations of fabric, time and talent. Check out the Comfy Cases Facebook page for information on this program. It's growing all the time!

# 30th Anniversary 2024 .... Should we make it a Quilt Show Celebration?

COVID has postponed a lot of life events for us all and our Quilt Show is one of them. It was November 2019 when we last presented to the community all our time and talents to celebrate quilting at its best. 2024 will be Dufferin Piecemaker's 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and may be just the reason to bring us all together to show how we have dealt with the struggles we have all lived through during the past two years. We have read guild newsletters, emails from Stitch and Share and heard of all the wonderful work our members have completed over this period and think it's time to let those creations be shared. We have beds, bags, and closets full of finished projects! We have provided the community with masks, gowns, headbands, pillowcases, quilts and more. It's time to celebrate our efforts in a grand way! Here is what we need to know from the membership (THAT'S YOU!!!) before we can proceed.

Question #1: Do you want to embrace the challenge and host a quilt show in 2024?

A downtown Orangeville event hosted at three churches or at the Orangeville Curling Club *is being considered*. This could reduce costs for the Guild, help to support our main street businesses and get them involved providing door prizes, displaying quilts and posters in windows etc. It would be a walking tour with a passport for entry and tea rooms in the host locations for our guests. To reduce the effort required by the membership, we could make it a Friday / Saturday show only and have speakers or bed turning at each location to offer more reasons for visitors to visit each venue. Having the show on Saturday would also allow shoppers attending the Orangeville Farmers' Market to visit our show. Please note that if this format is chosen, it does not mean all future quilt shows have to follow the same format.

Question #2: Do you support having the next quilt show in venues in Orangeville or do you prefer the previously-used venue at the Orangeville Fairgrounds?

Question #3: Will you volunteer to help plan a quilt show to showcase our Guild's work and to promote growth in our future guild membership?

QBA is a program within our guild where members teach other members. They share things they have learned from patterns, workshops or perhaps YouTube. Not everyone who participates completes a project, as some prefer to do their own thing. Regardless, all enjoy the camaraderie at the Saturday gatherings.

### Our May Sew Along will be Saturday the 7th at 10:00 AM.

Julie MacFarlane will be showing us how to make a Manx block.

The name Manx is from the native Celtic people from the Isle of Man. This Isle is located in the middle of the Irish Sea between England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland. At first glance, these blocks look very similar to the traditional log cabin quilt block but their construction is quite different, in a foundation-pieced quilt-as-you-go method. Traditionally, the fabric was torn, hand measurements were used and it was made by hand, not machine. The earliest known example of Manx patchwork is about 1820.



All you need is material, scissors, needle & thread (or machine) and your hands!!

Fabric requirements will be sent out on April 29. Look for the sew along Zoom link on Friday, May 6.

We have all had one (or a few!) of those moments when we wished we had known about a quilting tip, trick, technique or tool earlier in our quilting journey. Hence, this new section in the newsletter. Each month, I will interview a Guild member and share their words of wisdom for all of our benefit! (Sue HVZ—Editor)

### **April's** Tips and Tricks from **Kim Beckner!**

#### 1. How long have you been quilting?

Much the same as our frugal ancestors would have done, I began my quilting hobby back when our girls were toddlers, and leftovers from making their smocked dresses, or summer slogs sat in a corner calling my name. We didn't have the funds to waste, and I only had temporary possession of a borrowed family sewing machine. Most of the work I did back then, was by hand. When the time came that I wished to make something but could not afford a trip to the fabric store, I sat down with my scraps and started to sew them together. In a few years, I found out Charlie's aunt quilted and she took it to quilt it for me. This top was made around 1982 or 83, with the borrowed machine. Eventually, a magazine came home with me, containing some quilts to admire, patterns and instruction. I gave hand piecing a go, and managed to make about four blocks but they were very poor (I knew nothing of EPP back then) and I set them aside, knowing they'd never be a quilt by



Christmas. Later, in the 80's, with a job and a bit of extra cash, I purchased some liquid embroidery and block kits via Cameo and Artex being sold through home parties, where I could get some stuff for free just by hosting. A couple of these became quilts and I had a lady named Hazel Duke from Orangeville, who quilted them for me, although they seemed to take forever to be returned. Looking back, it wasn't really too bad considering they are hand quilted and still useable, although now tucked safely away.

#### 2. What is your favourite style of quilting?

I don't really have any preferences for what I will work with, styles or projects. I have favourite fabrics, and colours but I will try anything from classic quilting patterns, sampler quilts, to modern, and designing my own with a more artistic flare. I am especially keen to keep learning. In fact, I have begun to recognize many things about myself just from quilting, and one that stands out as I write this, is that the project must include some level of a challenge for me. If I were to sit and sew 3,000 pieces together, as in a scrappy quilt, it would just about drive me to quit this hobby. I have done just that during the COVID months, and if it wasn't for a quilt I saw of beautiful batik brights, I would not have been able to complete my quilts. I find now, with the longarm at home, I can achieve much challenge in 1) improving my ability to quilt on the tops I disliked making or 2) actually finishing my quilts. I currently have a scrappy I was very much enjoying the quilting of, on the longarm, unfinished now for well over a month. Why? Well.... Because apparently I love piecing.

### 3. What is one thing you know now that you wish you had known earlier in your quilting journey?

TRY NEW THINGS! From very young, I have always known that I would enjoy crafting. I've tried just about everything at one time or other. This has led to me housing a lot of 'stuff' that I may never use again. If I had it to live over, I would borrow more, purchase less, see if I like it first. I thought I would never enjoy the longarm quilting part of it, until I tried a machine and then several machines at the International quilt show. I found I do enjoy that and I have entered into another completely different hobby with a seemingly insurmountable amount of knowledge being shared freely on Youtube and online classes, and other quilters who share in the fashion of quilters..... because we have this in common! DO IT WITH FRIENDS! The Shop Hops have been the most fun of this whole journey for me.... Always go with as many friends who will safely fit in the vehicle! DON'T BUY SO MUCH! It's all pretty today. It will be just as pretty next year, when you actually need something more to do. And besides.... You have to sneak it in and find new hiding places.

## Who would like to do some swapping?

This idea was inspired by a quilt belonging to Marion Cole. Lots of scrappy 2.5 inch squares are used and the end result is just lovely! Marion used a 6.5" neutral as shown in the photo below.

This is how it will work: We'll start with 2.5 inch squares and go from there. Please, if you're actually cutting for this swap, put a variety in the bag — not 50 squares from the same fabric. The whole goal is to swap out our stashes of squares for some fresh ones! Most of us are kind of tired of our scrap stashes and want/need that fresh infusion from your tired stash.

### NO SIGN UP REQUIRED!

If you want to take part you place 50 2.5 inch squares in a baggie, along with a piece of paper that has your **name** and **email address** on it. Make up as many bags as you'd like with your name and email address and 50 squares in each one. In a perfect world with lots of bags if you supply two bags you'll get two different ones back. You'll get your bags back along with your name and email address paper that can be reused if you continue to swap.

You will drop these bags off to the passenger seat of my truck whenever you're out and about. If there is anyone who doesn't know where my truck is by now just ask. We'll do this swap



for a month or so, and then choose another size for another round of swapping. When I have enough bags to swap them out I'll let you know and you can pick them up from the same place.

Suggestions for other sizes and shapes are most welcome!

The one big thing we ask of you is to cut accurately so that the squares are usable to whomever gets them. Let's have some fun!


